

Pride and Prejudice Day

28 January 2024

Jane Austen's beloved novel Pride and Prejudice was first published on 28 January 1813, 211 years ago. Since then it has become the favourite novel of readers all over the world, and has never been out of print. Every year, Jane Austen's House celebrates Pride and Prejudice Day on 28 January. Join us for events in Chawton or online, drop into our social channels, or celebrate at home with a book, film, or simply a cup of tea!

? What's it about?

Pride and Prejudice is a sparkling comedy of manners, set in Regency England. It's filled with brilliantly recognisable characters and witty dialogue, but it also explores important contemporary anxieties around courtship, reputation and social expectations for women. Its heroine is the spirited Lizzy Bennet, who champions the importance of marrying for mutual love and respect, rather than for wealth or status. She is the ultimate 'obstinate, headstrong girl' and Jane Austen said she was 'as delightful a creature as ever appeared in print'. What do you think?

Rejection! Like many great works, this iconic novel was at first declined by a publisher. In 1797 Jane's father offered the novel to the publisher Thomas Cadell, but he sent the letter back with 'declined by return of post' scrawled across the top. The novel wasn't accepted for publication until 16 years later.


Publication:

After the success of Jane's first novel, *Sense and Sensibility*, her publisher Thomas Egerton agreed to publish *Pride and Prejudice* at his own risk, by purchasing the copyright. Jane had hoped for £150 but accepted the negotiated £110 (around £6000 today).

Pride and Prejudice was published in January 1813. The first edition sold out quickly, followed by a second edition later that year and a third in 1817. Since Egerton had purchased the copyright, however, he profited from these sales whilst Jane did not.

🔦 Writing:

Jane Austen first drafted Pride and Prejudice in 1796, when she was just 20. At this time it was called *First* Impressions, and it is thought that it may have been a novel in letters. However she extensively revised the manuscript in 1811-1812, once she had moved to Chawton, at which time she also gave it a new title: *Pride* and Prejudice.



🖋 Reading aloud:

On 27 January 1813, Jane received her first copies of *P&P*, fresh from the printer. That evening the Austens' neighbour, Miss Benn, came to dinner, and afterwards Jane and her mother 'set fairly at it' and read half of the first volume to her, without letting on that Jane was the author! Fortunately Miss Benn enjoyed it and admired the main character, Elizabeth Bennet.

☐ Jane Austen's novels were always published anonymously during her lifetime. The title page of *Pride and Prejudice* described the novel as being 'By the Author of "Sense & Sensibility".
